Knowing Troy's relentless duty to help people and his calming but firm demeanor, I knew Troy would be a great officer. He always remained open minded and listened without judging, a true attribute of an excellent officer. Although I only got to keep him full-time for a short while before he transferred to the Fulton County Sheriff's Office, Troy still stayed on part-time with me, helping whenever he could.

As great of an asset as Troy was to our department, I know his actions here paled in comparison to the devotion and loyalty he had for his wife and daughters. Anyone who knew Troy knew that he loved his girls in a way that can never be replaced. As much as we admired, respected, and cared about Troy, none of us can fully appreciate the loss that they are experiencing and the grief that they will carry with them for the rest of their lives.
